Photo Portrait Cruise Set for March 18!

his is a fascinating new event — designed to give members and friends of AMSS an opportunity to obtain a formal photo of their wooden boat which can be made into a stunning black and white or color portrait. Size can go up to 16" by 20" or larger. John Free with "Valentine" (K-38.. #20) and George Wheeler with "Reward," (K-38. #34) are coordinating the event.

A handout with tips on how to prepare your boat plus some sailing instructions will be distributed at the general meeting at the Southwestern Yacht Club on March 2nd, at 7:30 pm.. There will also be a sign-up sheet which will help coordinate your arrival on station southwest of Point Loma.

At 1 pm., George Wheeler will have cameras ready on Reward under double reefed main approximately three (3) miles SSW of Buoy #3 off Point Loma. If winds are light, sail hard on the wind — passing Reward on your port at about 75 yards. If winds are moderate at 12+ knots, pass Reward on a beam reach from the same distance.

Cost of photography will include film, processing and printing, or you may leave your camera on Reward to be used instead. Every effort will he made to get at least one good shot forward of the beam and on the quarter of each boat.

As an interesting background, boats not being photographed are encouraged to sail 500 to 1,000 yards out from Reward to windward to provide a period background fleet, circa the 1940s and 1950s. For more information call (619) 271-8629.




ea Safety is either ingrained through a personal experience or learned from the experiences of others. By far, the least costly and most efficient is the latter of the two possibilities. Captain John Claus Voss who, in 1901, sailed a three-masted dugout indian canoe around the world, leaves, in print, a legacy for us in the concluding pages of "The Venture-some Voyages of Captain Voss." Quoting from his text on "heaving to":

"By properly heaving to, on no occasion did I ever have a boat smashed in, nor have I sustained the slightest denting to vessel or outfit... I will go a little further claiming that on no oc-

casion while I was heave to under storm sail in a violent gale, have I shipped a sea that caused any damage... even though the storm sails had been carried away by the force of the

ning, are the worst of all!"



wind. These results I have obtained by observing the following: The storm sails were trimmed in such a way that the vessel's head lay near the wind; her headway was stopped and she made a nearly square drift. The wake then, instead of being under the storm, when sailing, will appear along the vessel's weather side, which has a most wonderful effect in smoothing down breaking seas on their approach. To sum up, I have found that breaking wind waves in open ocean becomes dangerous only when the vessel is driven through the water, and the faster she is traveling the more damage a sea is likely to inflict! The April Fools Regatta

pril 1 & 2, 1995 — This race takes us north from San Diego to an overnight raft-up in Mission Bay. The start is at either buoy #17 or #15, but has started further out the channel in light air conditions. The fleet must take buoy #3 to starboard (keeps you out of the kelp) and finish at the line extending from the North Jetty to the Mission Bay entrance buoy.

Skippers are trusted to mark their own times based on Ma Bell or the time check at the skippers meeting. The race results will be calculated at the raft-up. Each competitor is required to bring a trophy to award to the boat that finished just ahead of them. This trophy can reflect either the admiration or contempt that you hold for such a boat. The first to finish boat gives its trophy to the last to finish boat. Associate members with non-qualifying vessels are invited to participate in this event.

ay 27, 1995 — This is the major open event that AMSS sponsors and members of sister organizations are wholeheartedly invited to participate. Entries are invited from any qualifying wooden boat. There are several classes and many trophies per class. The day starts with breakfast and the skippers' meeting. The first of the staggered starts begin at noon with boats of similar capabilities going off at about 15 minute intervals.

The race is approximately 12 nautical miles, starting just off Reuben's Restaurant, to a marker at Tom Hams to port, to #5 and #6 to port, to a marker near the "Star of India" to port and back to the finish at Reuben's. The post race party is usually a wild party with raffle prizes, results, trophies and lots of food, drink and music. The entry fee is approximately \$30. Breakfast and dinner are extra. 
