

## Things We Could Be Doing Better by Richard Wright

After a year of getting phone calls on "why not" or "could we" or "damn, don't do that again," some ideas have surfaced that we all probably have in our hearts, but no one has taken on the actual tasks to date. Also, because of limited time to contribute, a less than perfect event had occurred. Here are a few common threads that emerged from this process:

YesterYear Regatta— In its heyday, eighty to ninety vessels churned the waters of the bay. What may help to get that type of participation back is good PR. We need to get on the calendars of the print media. We also need to coordinate with other events to entice Newport/LA boats south. Perhaps we could organize a campaign among our members to walk the docks and place announcements on eligible boats. If another Koehler yard party is organized, a disc jockey could provide the entertainment after the Bar-B-Q.

T-Shirts— The concensus is to stick with a more traditional design for the logo. Also, other clubs that go with an assortment of sizes in one style—men's crew neck short sleeve—find their ending inventories a lot smaller than ours.

Power Boat Membership— There are some fine power vessels in our harbor that boast the same pedigree and caring as our sailing members' boats. Lou Wolfgang's *Rum Runner* is a fine start, but we need an initiative to invite others to investigate the AMSS and we need to organize special activities for them at our events.

Handicaps— The handicap committee members must be the most unsung volunteers of all time. This is not limited to AMSS; every other racing organization wrestles with what is fair and just. The most significant YesterYear observation was that the skippers really wanted to be racing like with like, even if their chance at the overall win was lessened. The

suggestion was to group the staggered starting time of similar vessels together rather than starting by rating sequence throughout the entire fleet. After all, there is no better surge of pride or ego than to take a fellow H-28 at the mark or to outpoint a similar vessel on the windward leg.

Please consider these suggestions and present your ideas at a general or Board meeting. Thank you.
