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

FULL MOON=High tides and low tides

December 7, 1991 is two days after a new moon and this also brings higher and lower tides. 9:03am: 6.5 feet....4:25 pm: -0.7 feet.

We will be conducting our annual Half Pint O' Rum Race this year on December 7th with an approximate 11 to 12 a.m. start which means you will be finishing near or at the low tide. I mention this because I listened to numerous radio conversations on November 21st (Full Moon) between the Coast Guard and vessels asking for assistance after having gone aground in San Diego Bay. Our race will be run over a course that does have its shallow-water spots, so watch your charts and depth sounders.

I also would like to point out that the area where we designate as the race finish, has become very crouded with vessels on mooring buoys, anchored and even some that have sunk. You will find that the only area off Shelter Island that has a somewhat clear path to the shoreline is directly in front of the boat launching ramp. At present, there is one (1) sunken vessel located on the eastern end off the Bali Hai Restaurant and it is marked with a wreck buoy.

Half Pint O'Rum Race

It's that time of year, folks. Time to hie ye out to the market for a fine container of high quality rum, to be your entry fee for a legendary race of high action, high adventure, high jinks and high times at high noon on Dec. 7 (50th anniversary of a day of infamy).

Yes, this is the test of true seamanship, where you will start, sails down without your engine, right off the anchor, hopefully after your skipper, his mug, dog, and dinghy, is all back aboard. He or she will be rowing/paddling/wading/surfing/swimming from the beachside skippers' meeting where all skippers will be forced to sample the rum mixture early on. The finish of the race will require sailing as close as you dare to the beach at Shelter Island, dropping off (in a dinghy hopefully) a designated finisher, (not necessarily the skipper) who will row/paddle/wade ashore with an empty mug, and sample the keg. Your elapsed time is recorded when the empty mug is shown to the RC. This same Race Committee, who will test and maintain quality control of the mixture in the keg of entry "fees" periodically throughout the day, will also be responsible for penalizing and dealing harshly with the contestants/racers for any infringements of nautical courtesy, such as outright bald-faced cheating, carelessly running into other contestants, fouling anchored boats, using cheap rum as an entry fee, not bringing a mug to the finish line, etc. Bonuses will be considered for harmless yet creative "cheating", unusual costumes, and providing extra amenities at the skippers meeting or the raftup.

To find the starting area, proceed under the Coronado bridge to harbour buoy 26 then come to approx. 165 deg. mag. (Please consult a recent harbor chart for the location of shoals east of the Coronado bridge.) We will be on the sand beach on the west side of the south bay just southeast of some Navy structures. If you get as far as Crown Cove, you've gone too far (and possibly aground).

The skippers meeting starts at 11:30. Bring your mug, and bring your jug.

And we know it. The years thunder by. The dreams of youth grow dim where they lie caked in dust on the shelves of patience. Before we know it, the tomb is sealed. Where then, lies the answer? In choice. Which shall it be: bancruptcy of purse or bankruptcy of life?
