Tim and Karanne own Muki, a 47' yawl built of African mahogany in West Germany. The boat sailed from Germany to England, Spain and the Mediterranean, crossed over to the Miami area and up the East Coast. Then she went back down to St. Vincent and other parts of the Carribean. She did a lot of charter work.

The Terrys own Figlebaum, a PC built in 1947 at Kettenburg Boat Works. The new owners have added new mahogany cap rails and a new paint job. Her colors are Woolsey deep water blue, red bottom and yacht white deck and spars. The Terrys hope to add a new main sail and spinnaker before the start of the 1983 PC racing season.

Solace II is a boat built in 1901 in England (designed in 1898 by Blake). She is 48' on deck and has a pitch pine hull. She is carvel planked with a flush deck. In 1960 she was sailed to the Carribean for charter service and on to California in 1962. She had her first U.S. overhaul at Paul Kettenburg's yard in 1962.

After searchingfor 2 years from Seattle to Fort Lauderdale Bob purchased Solace in Oxnard. She has undergone 5 years of restoration from keel to truk and stem to stern by Lin and Bob and they believe she is the most seaworthy ship of her size and age on the West Coast. Her credits include winner in Class 2 of the Ryde Le Havre Brimham Race in 1958 and in Class A of the Brimham Cherbourg Race in force 8 winds in 1959. (Editor's note: Race names may be incorrect)

The Sweinharts won a special award for restoration at the 1982 Southern California Boat Show in Newport.

In 1919 Solace 11 was a member of the Royal Yacht Squadron. At that time she was owned by Frank Chaplin who was banker to King George.

12' CLASSIC MOTOR LAUNCH DONATED TO AMSS

Charles R. Ladow, former Commodore of San Diego Yacht Club has graciously donated a classic 12' motor launch to the AMSS. Mr. Ladow wants the vessel restored and is pleased that we will undertake its reconditioning. Hopefully it will be done in time to use it as a shore boat for the Yesteryear Regatta.

A vote by the membership at the last General Meeting unanimously approved the undertaking and the board then appropriated up to \$600.00 for the restoration (\$300.00 is the expected cost).

WE NEED YOU!!!

Approximately 300 hours of labor are required for the restoration. This will include 25 new frames (steam bent), new decking, floorboards, thwarts, rails, etc. as well as a complete refinishing. Bob Elderis in charge of the project and John Frost and others will advise. We would like 3-5 people to do most of the work so things don't get out of hand. Anyone who is interested in this project is encouraged to lend assistance.

The work will be the same as what most of us will, at one time or another, be doing on our own vessels. So this is an excellent opportunity for "hands on" learning. If you want to be one of the primary rebuil ders or one of the assistants, give Bob Elder a call at 486-3402.
