

NEW MEMBERS

Peggy & Jack Bone 1914 Guy St. San Diego, CA 92103

Peggy and Jack own Cloud Nine. This nine meter class racing sloop was built in 1937 in the Anker-Jensen yard in Norway to an Anker design. She measures 50'10" l.o.d., 35'9" l.o.w. with a 9'6" beam and 7'6" draft. She also carries a PHRF handicap of 78.

Vikki & Keith Korporaal 7009 Aster Pl. Carlsbad, CA 92008

Keith and Vikki own Fair Dinkum which is a Sam Rabl "Picaroon" design. Mr. Rabl designed this yacht in 1926 and Fair Dinkum was built in 1956. Fair Dinkum is a 21' cutter and is featured on page 182 of the second edition of Mr. Rabl's book, Boatbuilding in Your Own Backyard.

Marilyn & Ronald Render 2003 Caminito Circulo Norte La Jolla, CA 92037

The Renders own $\underline{\text{Toulouse}}$ which is an H-28 that follows Mr. Herreshoff's original lines. Built in Maine in 1954, she has spent most of her years in the New England area.

Woodson & Jeffrey Woods 2112 Manchester Ave. #3 Cardiff by the Sea, CA 92007

Woody and Jeff own Scottish Fantasy II which is another John Alden design. This impressive 57' yawl was designed and built in 1931 originally as a sloop.

Grace and Bill Bodle 971 Hilldale Ave. Berkeley, CA 94708

Grace and Bill own Panda, a riveted iron plate schooner, designed by A. Mylne in 1937. She was built by Camper and Nicholson, South Hampton, U.K., in 1938. She is 131' LOA, 117' LOD with a 22' beam, 87'LOW, and her 186 tons draw only 14'! Her spars are spruce with a main mast of 140'. Unlike Invader which is reportedly a converted cargo schooner, Panda was designed and built to yacht standards. Her distinguishing characteristics, as listed on the application, are "NONE."

PROSPECTIVE MEMBERS

Lori & Jeff Hickman 6348 Jeff St. San Diego, CA 92115

Earth is an Alden "Priscilla" design owned by the Hickmans. Earth is a 29'9" sloop which was built in Santa Barbara in 1958 and is carvel planked Mahogany over Oak. Designed about 1937, this yacht displays the large windows on the dog house found in so many of Alden's designs. Lori and Jeff's application has been held over another month pending additional application information.

NAUTICAL NOMENCLATURE


During our last conversation with Gaffley he brought up one of the most descriptive sea terms which unfortunately has fallen out of polite conversation. "However" he said, "that shouldn't bother the AMSS."

"Anyway," Gaffley continued, "when I first started sailing as a cabin boy years ago, cannonballs when needed for ready use were stacked pyramid fashion on metal trays called 'monkeys'. These had dished recesses so that each cannonball would fit snugly and not become disturbed by the ship's movement."

"On the top of the line ships, like the one on which I served, the 'monkeys' were made of brass and polished. There was a small problem however, because in very cold weather the cannon-balls and the brass monkey would, being different metals, contract at different rates. So when it turned really cold, like one winter I remember up near Nova Scotia, the cannonballs at the bottom would shift and the pyramid would collapse. Thus the expression: 'Cold enough to freeze the balls off a brass monkey'."

"Hardcore" Race course

Saturday April 7.

Start time: 11:00AM Racing and Cruising will start together.

The Race will be from San Diego Bay Bouy 15 to the Mission Bay Entrance Bouy.

Starting line will be between bouy 15 and the Committee Boat anchored to the west of the bouy.

Start proceedure will be:

Time Flag Horn

10:50 white-up short 10 min warning

10:54 white-down

10:55 blue-up short 5 min preparatory

10:59 blue-down

11:00 red- up long Start In case of no flags sound signals will remain

the same.

Both classes will race to Mission Bay Entrance.

Cruising Class will take bouy 5 to starboard.


Racing Class will take bouy 1 to starboard.

Finish: Both classes take the green Mission

Bay entrance bouy to starboard. Record your own time when bouy is abeam the helmsman. Please record time by Hour, Min, SEC. Be sure to remain west of the bouy as there are submerged rocks

between the bouy and the jetty.

Proceed to the raft up in Mariner's Cove. Use care entering Mission Bay, there are numerous hazzards in the channel due to the dredging operation.



FOOLS TROPHY RACE Sunday April 8

Start time: 12:00 Racing and cruising will start together.

The race will be from the Navy tower off Mission Beach to San Diego Bay.

Starting line will be from the Navy tower to the Committee Boat anchored east of the tower.

Start Proceedure will be:

Time Flag Horn

11:50 white-up short 10 min warning

11:54 white-down

11:55 blue-up short 5 min preparatory

11:59 blue-down

12:00 red-up long start
In case of no flags sound signals will remain
the same.

Both classes will race to San Diego bouy 15. Cruising Class will take bouy 3 to port.

Racing Class will take bouy 1 to port, bouy 3 to port, bouy 5 to port, bouy 1 to port,

bouy 3 to port, bouy 5 to port.

Finish: cross line between bouy 15 and Committee boat anchored to the west of the bouy (Southern Star). If there is no committee boat record your own time.

Both races will be run under USYRU rules, except that no protests will be allowed. All timepieces should be set to Bell Telephone time on Saturday morning. Please give the Saturday finish times to Dave Gibbs at the beach party or by calling 488-7305 as soon as possible. Have a good race!
