

LETTER TO AMSS

The following letter was written on April 4, 1994, but not received by the Editors until May 7th.

I am writing in response to Ed Barr's Port Side column in the April issue of the Albatross in which he admonished the membership to have more involvement and pride in their club. As a past board member and editor of the Albatross, I certainly understand where he is coming from, but there is another side to the story. One need only gaze at the Calendar of Events for a major clue! Allow me to summarize the 1994 calendar. Four months have two events scheduled; five months have three events scheduled; one month has four events scheduled; and only two months have one event scheduled. Granted, I've counted monthly meetings, but they require work too. By anyone's standards, this is a boatload of events for a club like the AMSS. It takes a lot of work to backup a calendar like this.

I believe the club has over scheduled itself. The downside to such a condition - and it's a big one - is burn out. It's really sad when members, especially new members, step forward to contribute, then work themselves straight into a bad attitude trying to keep pace with an impossible calendar. There's an excellent example right in the April Albatross itself. In a box on page three the April Fool's Regatta is promoted for April 2nd & 3rd and on page four there is a call for volunteers to help paint Koehler's docks on the same two days! So, which is it? Sailing or painting and why would anyone schedule a sailing event and a work party on Easter Sunday anyway?

I submit that, for a healthy, long term existance, the club must cut its schedule. It just can't afford to continue burning out good people. "Wise old" Doug Smith is right when he challenges the membership to put up or shut up. When he and others formed the club twenty years ago, only one event was on the calendar for the whole year, the Yesteryear Regatta. With a full year to plan the event, it was really done right. Ask Doug what it was like back then; you'll be shocked.

Cut the schedule back to what, you might ask? Well, if it were up to me, I'd concentrate on two high profile annual events, say the Yesteryear Regatta and the Wooden Boat Festival, and convert all the other items on the calendar to very informal events. How do you put on an informal event? Just publish it. Those who are interested will show up. No trophies, no race committee, just simple fun.

EQUAL TIME RESPONSE

In response to Gary's letter on Page 2, we do not believe that AMSS would become a better club by limiting its activities and eliminating some events. We joined this club for two primary reasons. First, we strongly believe in the purpose of the society to preserve and promote interest in vessels of ancient vintage and classic design. In order to promote that interest we must bring the boats out. A single classic boat is interesting. A group of classic boats is spectacular! We don't believe that preserving and promoting interest in wooden boats should only occur one or two times a year.

Second, in the years since we joined, we have made some close and dear friends among the members of this club, and we believe we will meet many more as long as we make the opportunity to meet them. It is as much for the socializing as the sailing that we continue our membership.

During our tenure on the board, it was always our goal to try to offer to the membership, new and old, the opportunity to participate in one on-the-water event each month, even if that event was sitting at the dock and talking to visitors with interests in classic boats and boat design. Combined with one general meeting, where we could come together and socialize, it seemed to be a balanced schedule of activities for the average member. All members are not expected to attend all activities. There should be enough activities accessable to members inspite of busy and varied schedules. That way, if an activity is missed, there is one next month, not several months away. It is our conviction that AMSS can not interest prospective members in joining (and paying \$50 each year) if there are only two events a year.

Also we don't believe that AMSS should limit their on-the-water activities to only racing. For those cruisers, who make up a good proportion of our flag vessels, who don't want to race, there should be some on-the-water events. We agree with Gary that some of the activities should be very informal and many are. There is nothing wrong with the members getting together informally for either a "beer can" race or an over-nighter to Mission Bay. To us, that's the very essence of this club. The sharing of interests, talking about recent problems and repairs, giving/receiving advice, etc. that occurs at such events is, after all, fulfilling the objective of this Club.

The Editors
