had never seen it before even though there were over fifty burgees from



## February General Meeting



# PORT SIDE by Rod Latimer

Blasted Anchorage— The gale that blew in on January 17th was the worst in recent years. Winds in the bay reached speeds of 50 knots, causing havoc in the Shelter Island free anchorage. The last count showed seven vessels on the beach and at least four more broken up on the rocks and sunk. In most cases it appears the ground tackle failed, rather than dragged, on unmanned vessels. At the height of the gale three other vessels had ground tackle problems, but all had anchor watches aboard and were never in danger. It pays to check your ground tackle often and keep it in top notch condition. An anchor watch during periods of obvious bad weather is good seamanship in anybody's book. It could also save your vessel from being battered by another vessel left unattended.

Windsurfer Dilemma— The Coast Guard has ruled that a windsurfer is a "vessel" and as such has the same right-of-way privileges as any other vessel under sail. Although windsurfers are banned by the Harbormaster from the entrance channel to Shelter Island, there are many of these ultralight sailors in the inner bay, particularly in La Playa Cove. Because of their speed and acceleration, it is virtually impossible to keep clear of them. Few seem to know the rules of the road, but most can be counted to fall off directly in front of your vessel when you are least prepared. We can only suggest an additional bow lookout when transiting this area during warm weekend days.

Narrow Channel— Beating out Shelter Island Channel recently during a light southerly, the Harbor Police patrol boat came along side to inform us we must remain in the right half of the channel at all times. No full channel tacks are allowed due to the traffic hazard. Although unclear, it appears our options are to power until clear of the day mark at the channel entrance or to perform a succession of short tacks. Fore warned is fore armed.
