

PORT SIDE

As there does not seem to be anything unusual in Aids to Navigation or other items of interest to sailors, it's time again for our Sailors Trivia.

FAGGED OUT: When a line or rope becomes unlaid or frayed because of not being properly whipped, the end that has been alowed to fray is called fagged. Hence, when we are ragged at the edges, we are said to be fagged out.

HALF MAST: In 1612, a ship called "Hearts Ease" sailed up the Thames Estuary with her Ensign at half mast due to the death of her Captain, who was killed by natives while searching for the Northwest Passage. Before this, ships had flown black flags in tribute to the dead. The half mast custom is now worldwide.

DOG BARKING NAVIGATION: In the early days, when the exploriers were navigating the inside passages along the Pacific Northwest, there were no navigation aids to assist them. The pilots of these ships compiled their own 'aids' in their logs as they went. One such aid was that, when passing a certain spot, they would hear dogs barking. After several voyages by a spot where the same dogs was heard to bark at the ship, the location was confirmed and the dog's unique bark was listed as an 'aid' to navigation, hence Dog Barking Navigation. Today, this same principle could be applied to any piloting situation where a unique sound is heard repeatedly near a specific location, such as a whistler buoy or even a fog horn.

SPEAKING OF SMALL BOATS...

There will be a small boat messabout on August 11 - 15 at the Navy Y.C. at Fiddlers Cove on Coronado's Silver Strand for those with, or who have interest in, small boats, sailing small boats, building small traditional boats, or picnics, or parties, or just messing about. AMSS and the So. Cal. Small Boat Messabout Society, invite you to "mess about" with them at anytime during this five-day event. Fiddlers Cove, about 2 miles south of Glorietta Bay, is the spot. The cost to attend the Messabout is \$5 per day per person, with or without a boat. This is to cover the cost of picnic food and supplies. Bring your friends and kids, etc., but, sorry, no dogs because of the resident ducks.

There is a single launch ramp available, places to anchor or tie your little bosts overnight, and all of South Bay for sensational small boat sailing. If you are a kayak or canoe person, there will be excursions for paddle craft, guided by Sam Radding.

Besides the in-the-water boatng, plans inclde hikes along the bay and ocean, a pancake breakfast, chile pig-out, pot luck barbeque, etc.
